



Doing Without

At some point, we have to do without. If we travel, we do without whatever won't fit in the luggage. If we get sick, we do without the energy we like to have. If someone we love dies, we do without the close companionship we enjoyed for so long.


As we enter the final days of Lent, our minds turn to the final days of Jesus' life. In ministry, Jesus enjoyed the companionship of disciples, the warm reception of caring households, the adulation of large crowds, and the appreciation of those he healed. He had his enemies, but his life had meaning, and his prayer to the Father was rich.



At the end, though, Jesus had to do without. His friends turned against him or abandoned him. He suffered imprisonment, false witnesses, and torture. He was nailed to a cross in a gruesome death.

No one wants to go through anything like that. But somehow, whenever we suffer a loss, our sufferings are lightened by the memory of Jesus.

Paul writes to the Philippians, "For the sake of Christ Jesus our Lord, I have accepted the loss of all things, depending on faith to know him and the power of the resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by being conformed to his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead." We can do without if we believe someday we will do with the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

"The Great Escape"

When interviewing people who come to Morning Glory Ministries for clothing and other assistance, I often ask them, "Where did you sleep last night?"

One man answered, "In prison. I was released at 3 o'clock this morning."

He was released in the middle of the night with only the clothes on his back. It was on a cold day in January, so he needed a coat among other items.



He is not the only one for whom Morning Glory is one of their first stops when leaving prison. I asked one, "What is it like to be imprisoned?"

He said, "I felt trapped. You are always told what to do and when to do it. It is not good. It woke me up to straighten out my life so I never go back."

The Gospel story this Sunday is about a woman who felt trapped -- though not in a prison. She was caught in adultery and was about to be stoned by a group of men. The Gospel says, "They made her stand in the middle." Picture that: a group of men holding stones encircling you ready to start throwing.

Jesus enters this circle. He tells the men if they are sin-free then cast away, if not, drop it. They all drop the stones. He then tells the woman that she's forgiven. The men were trapped by anger and self -righteousness, the woman by guilt. Jesus freed them all.

If we feel trapped or "imprisoned" by anger against another or by guilt of a previous sin, Jesus' remedy is **humility** for the former and **forgiveness** for the latter. Jesus wants us to be free as well.
