





### **Slain and Victorious Lamb**


Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, and it also proclaims the church's faith in the resurrection of Christians. Death looms as the fearful fate of every human life, but Easter removes the finality of death and opens a broader vision. It is hard to imagine that one single event could have such an effect on human history, but that was the meaning of Jesus' resurrection.



mals, no dead lamb has ever left much of a mark on the world. But this one did. The Lamb is Jesus slain, but standing, and receiving the praise of all living things.

A lamb first entered our religious tradition as a symbol of Passover. On the night before Israel's exodus from Egypt, faithful Jewish families slaughtered a lamb and rubbed its blood on their doorposts. They were spared the worst of the plagues, the death of the firstborn. That plague finally forced Pharaoh's hand and set the people free.

Jesus Christ appears in Revelation as a slain Lamb. His blood protects us from the harm of death and sets us free from sin. Through his death and resurrection, he has brought us forgiveness and opened a way for us through death to life.

### A GOOD BREAKFAST SPOT

Breakfast at Morning Glory Ministries can resemble an airport, lots of people walking fast, toting luggage or wearing backpacks. Since they have no place to store their belongs, those who are homeless have to lug all their belongings wherever they go. It's tiring.

In addition to receiving a hearty breakfast here, they can literally unburden themselves, that is, set their belongs down on the floor. After they have finished eating, most will stay seated until the dining room is closed at 8:00 AM. They need the break from carrying their burdens

The Gospel story this weekend is about another group of people who come to break-



fast who need to unburden themselves. After Jesus' death, the apostles went back to work, that is, fishing. After fishing all night they had caught nothing. On top of being tired and empty-handed, some, no doubt, felt guilty for not standing by Jesus when arrested, especially Peter.

So, the resurrected Jesus appears to them. First, He showed them where to catch more fish. Then he said, "Come, have breakfast." He bar-b-qued some fish for them on the beach. During breakfast, he essentially forgave Peter for denying him. In various ways, thanks to Jesus, the apostles could let go of their burdens of sadness, guilt, fatigue and having no food.

We all need someone or some place where

we can unload our burdens. Like the homeless at Morning Glory, or the apostles in the Gospel, we all need a good "breakfast spot."
