The Good Fight

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time 2 Timothy 4:6–8, 16–18



We all admire people who hold their ground in the face of all opposition. They overcome the odds. They recover from poorly placed trust. They talk like they make sense to themselves even if no one agrees. They believe strongly, not weakly. They have values and principles. They think the world should be another way. They keep their vision alive in the midst of criticism and ridicule.

When someone like that dies, you will hear people say, "She fought the good fight." Or he did. It is a wonderful expression. It implies that life was a struggle, but the struggle was worth it, and that this person engaged in the struggle to the end. "He fought the good fight."

This expression comes from the Second Letter to Timothy, where it is heard today in a slightly different form: "I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith." To be able to say that is a great testimony. "I have fought the good fight." It means that faith is a struggle, but worth it. It means we have faced opposition. We may not have won the race, but we finished it.

When we persevere in our struggles, it does not go unnoticed. Even if we never achieve all our goals, we have achieved the struggle, and that brings its own reward. 

Position Objective

This position is a key support function for the parishes, schools, cemeteries, and chancery office within the Diocese. The HR Generalist will guide employee experience, serving the people who serve the people of God.

- Maintain strict confidentiality.

Position Title: Victim Assistance Coordinator

Reports to: Director, Office of Child and Youth Protection

Position Objective

The Victim Assistance Coordinator (VAC) is responsible for coordination of efforts providing compassionate outreach, support and resources to survivors and their families in cases of sexual abuse perpetrated by diocesan personnel. The VAC accompanies clients through the process of investigation and review of their case, including managing treatment referral services for these individuals and their families. The VAC collaborates closely with the Executive Director of *Journey to Bethany*, a program designed to serve those harmed by clergy sexual abuse through actions of healing and justice. The VAC provides support and guides Diocesan staff and clergy who assist survivors in their journey toward healing and reconciliation.

This is a temporary position averaging 40 hours per week during the months of November and December and possibly January.

Essential Duties

Coordinate Victim Services process for healing and reconciliation.

- Accompany and coordinate ongoing support to survivors.
- Cooperate with the Ombudsman in responding with care and support to survivors when they
 make an initial report of abuse to the Diocese.
- Follow up and provide support, information, etc. with the survivor, family and any other appropriate persons.
- Maintain confidentiality regarding all cases and matters under the purview of the OCYP as well as related documents, calls, files and related information.
- Coordinate pastoral care to survivors of sexual abuse and family members.
- Organize personal meetings between survivors/family members and the Bishop or his delegate.
- Accompany victim/survivors or read their impact statement to Review Board when requested.
- Bring survivor requests to appropriate diocesan leadership.

Promote healing through outreach programs which represent the Diocese's strong commitment to healing and restoring trust among its faithful.

- Consult with the Director of *Journey to Bethany* and Diocesan leaders to strategically plan for outreach and restoration of trust among the faithful, relative to survivors of clergy sexual abuse.
- Collaborate and coordinate with the *Journey to Bethany* Director to provide survivor resources as needed.
- Assist the Director for *Journey to Bethany* in building relationships with community coalitions to connect survivors with resources and inform local organizations of *Journey to Bethany's* work and resources.

Provide support and resources to Diocesan staff and clergy as needed in providing care to victims and their families within Diocesan parishes and schools.

 Assist the Bishop or diocesan leaders in preparation for meetings with victim-survivors and their families.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

- Understand the effects of trauma, sexual abuse and spiritual abuse.
- Demonstrate a victim-survivor centered approach.
- Understand and practice trauma-informed care and response.
- Demonstrate active listening skills, demonstrating patience and compassion.
- Demonstrate empathy, understanding and perseverance.
- Handle sensitive issues with confidentiality.
- Manage crisis and conflict with professionalism and respect.
- Communicate effectively (verbal, written) in a clear and professional manner with a diverse group of people.
- Create and maintain relationships with a broad range of people with varying needs.
- Prioritize conflicting demands.
- Demonstrate consistent attention to detail.
- Work independently with confidence and minimal managerial oversight.

Basic Qualifications

Required:

- Bachelor's degree in human services field such as organizational behavior, sociology, education or any equivalent combination of education and/or experience
- Intermediate skill level in Microsoft Office Suite and ability to learn customized database software
- Some local travel required

Preferred but not required:

- Minimum 3 years' experience in trauma and crisis response
- Knowledge of Restorative Justice practices
- Knowledge of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People and Essential Norms
- Familiarity with the Catholic understanding of ministry is an asset.

Improving Your Shot

A guest came to Morning Glory wanting to know if his birth certificate had arrived yet in the mail. One of the services that Morning Glory provides is helping those who are homeless get proper identification, like a birth certificate and a state photo ID, as they need those to get a job.

When we help someone who was born outside of Missouri, we typically send the application through the mail and have to wait until their birth certificate comes back. Depending on which state the application was sent, this could take anywhere from two to six weeks.

Fortunately, for this man who inquired about his birth certificate, it had arrived. When I told him that we had it, he immediately smiled, looked upward, put his hands together like in prayer, and exclaimed out loud, "Thank you God!"



His reaction indicated that on the way to Morning Glory he prayed to God that his birth certificate would be here, and so, it was for him literally a prayer answered.

The Book of Sirach in the first reading this Sunday says, "The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds; it does not rest till it reaches its goal, nor will it withdraw till the Most High responds." That imagery of a prayer piercing the cloud is likening a prayer to an arrow that soars up, up, up, going through clouds until if finds its mark.

Imagine if all prayers could be visibly seen as arrows flying upward, how many we would see at any given time. In the Gospel Jesus tells us which prayers "get through" and which ones do not. He tells the parable of two guys praying in the temple. One guy is arrogant, boasting that he is better than others, and the other guy is humble admitting he is a sinner. Jesus says it's the prayer of the humble guy that "gets through."

The prayer that Jesus praised begins with these words, "O God, be merciful to me a sinner." Prayers said with true humility are the ones that pierce the clouds.

That's how we improve our shot.
