



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

"Into this world, this demented inn, in which there is absolutely no room for Him at all, Christ has come uninvited. But because He cannot be at home in it, because He is out of place in it, and yet He must be in it, His place is with those others for whom there is no room." -Thomas Merton

Dear Friends in Christ,

It is a simple, good-natured thing when we see it. It puts a smile on our faces. When we deliberately make room for another. It can happen on a crowded elevator: "come on, get in, we'll all squeeze together!" It happens around crowded dinner tables in our homes, we add extra chairs and plates to make sure all have a place at the table.

Sometimes it is easiest to do this with those we already know and love. What happens when we are asked to make room for a stranger?

There is a reality playing out in our border states as more and more immigrants and migrants seek entry into the United States. Our Catholic faith calls us to welcome the stranger, and from our location in the middle of the country, we are in a better position to make room.

We are expecting very soon to welcome a bus carrying 50-100 immigrants and migrants from El Paso, Texas, being transported here by the Annunciation House, a Catholic not-for-profit group that assists migrants and refugees. These individuals have already been processed and screened, and now are looking for help getting connected to family and friends, housing, jobs and basic needs like food and clothing.

There are several established and well-organized groups involved in welcoming these individuals, but I am encouraging a strong response from the Catholic faithful in our diocese to join the effort.

I know there are many in our diocese with a heart to minister and to serve. Please contact Leyden Rovelo-Krull (krull@diocesekcsj.org), director of the diocesan Office of Hispanic Ministry, to find out how you can help.

Additionally, *I am asking our parishes to take up an additional collection during the weekend Masses November* 5-6 that can be used to provide basic needs for these men, women and children who seek a better life and an opportunity to earn a living and raise a family in a safer place. The collection will assist not only the individuals arriving on the initial bus but will also be used for any future groups that we welcome to our city. This collection should be submitted to the Diocese within two weeks of receipt by the parish.

Jesus came into a world with no room for him, uninvited. But, for those who made room for him, everything changed. When we make room, just a bit of room, for Jesus, for the poor and needy, for the stranger, then we will be changed. As the Lord tells us in Matthew 25, when we welcome the stranger, we welcome Him.

Making room for others is a sign of magnanimity, that is, acting with a big heart. It is also a key to the Kingdom of God.



2 T2 Thessalonians 2:16 - 3:5


St. Paul seems invincible. He authored a series of letters of towering importance for Christianity. He devoted his entire life to the Gospel. He traveled amid great hardship, endured shipwreck and imprisonment, and debated the truth with friend and foe alike. Throughout it all, it seemed as though nothing could stop him.

We all know people like that. They are great leaders, committed to a cause, who persevere in the midst of natural and human obstacles to obtain the prize they seek. Solid as a rock, they invite admiration.

St. Paul was like that. But once in a while, we see a different Paul, a more human Paul, one who needed help to stay the course. The Second Letter to the Thessalonians comes from Paul and some of his companions. They had success in Thessalonica, and they hoped it would repeat elsewhere. But there were obstacles. "Brothers and sisters, pray for us, so that the word of the Lord may speed forward and be glorified, as it did among you, and that we may be delivered from perverse and wicked people, for not all have faith."

"Not all have faith." In those few words hide a world of sorrow, disappointment, and pain. Not all have faith. Not everyone believes as we do, and it is sometimes hard to persevere. Paul seemed invincible, but only because he relied on the help of others, who prayed for him in his distress.

Take A Bite

There are a few guests who come to Morning Glory for breakfast who for religious reasons do not eat pork. Sometimes the main dish is an egg casserole that has pork. When it does, they refuse to take any. Fortunately, there are usually other items that they can eat.

It's tempting to think, "Beggars can't be choosers," and so they should eat it any way. However, there's something admirable in their refusal on faith grounds, as they sure are quite hungry.

The first reading this Sunday tells a portion of the story of a family that refused to eat pork for religious reasons. The family consisted of a mother and her seven sons. One by one each son was told to eat pork or be tortured and killed. All seven refused to eat the pork and all seven



died, as well as their mother. One said, "We are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors."

There may be times, right now or in the future, where our faith will be tested. Most likely, it will not be tested to the point of torture or death, but it may be tested by being ostracized by those close to us.

Our faith should be counter-cultural. When it is, will we give in and compromise, or hold fast to our beliefs?
