





The Happy Community

Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time 2 Thessalonians 3:7–12




Living in community is hard. In a family, a school, or the workplace, it is hard to get along with others. There are benefits to community life. When you cannot make it on your own, others lift you up. You benefit from the skills and love they share. And when others need help, you are there. You feel satisfied when you use your gifts to help someone else. A happy community enjoys many blessings. The gifts of individuals are marvelous to behold, but even more so is the result — the community becomes its own living force, with its own love, devotion, and commitment.

It works as long as everyone helps out. As soon as someone does not, resentment creeps in, and the beauty of the community is destroyed.

Paul the Apostle faced this problem when he and his companions visited the Thessalonians. Some people were taking advantage of others. It was not working, and it would never work. So the missionaries set an example. They were guests. They did not have to do anything to help out, but they did. "We wanted to present ourselves as a model for you," Paul wrote. "When we were with you, we instructed you that if anyone was unwilling to work, neither should that one eat." There is no such thing as a free lunch.


Your church is a community. It relies on your faith, your participation, and your help. You eat and drink the Eucharist. Do you also work?

STRIPPED

On more than one occasion, upon walking into the men's restroom at Morning Glory I have seen a man totally naked standing by the sink giving himself a "bird bath." There are few places to bathe oneself when living on the street, so for some it comes to this.

Their literal nakedness exposed for others to see reflects a deeper nakedness. For those who are chronically homeless, they have lost much: shelter, a change of clothing, a job, relationships, personal safety and more.

The readings this weekend give vivid images of the end of times where all will be lost and destroyed - stripped, so to speak. There will be a heat so intense that both branches *and roots* will be scorched. Temples will be destroyed to the extent that not one stone will be on top of another. These Biblical images are ones of *total destruction*.

Most of us probably don't realize it, but our selfworth is bolstered by things external to us: the house we live in, our job title, our relationships, our bank account, the car we drive, the clothes we wear, our health, our independence. A good "thought experiment" to take to prayer sometime is to imagine losing **all of that.** Become as naked as a homeless person in the Morning Glory restroom. You have lost your job, your clothes, your home, your relationships, your financial security, even your health. Like the images from the readings this Sunday, imagine the supports of your self-worth have *all* been burned away. What is left?

Hopefully, after going through this imaginary existential strip-tease, we see that stripped of all, we still have a relationship with God, the one thing that cannot be taken. We can still sense a relationship between our deepest self and God.

If we can lose everything and hang on to that relationship, that is, persevere in our faith, then Jesus says, we will "secure our lives."
